<p>From 1790 to 1807 Liverpool built 61 of the 161 British slave ships. Liverpool controlled 40% of all European slave trade, and around 80% of the British slave trade.</p>		<b>Slave</b>	A person who is the legal property of another and is forced to obey them.
<p>Between 1783 and 1793 Liverpool generated £15,000,000 in revenue from the slave trade. Today that is equal to over £16 billion in today's money.</p>		<b>Freedom</b>	The power or right to act, speak or think as one wants.
<p>At least 12 million Africans were taken to the Americas and sold as slaves between 1532 and 1832 at least 1 third of them in British ships.</p>		<b>Trade</b>	The action of buying and selling goods and services.
<p>In the slavery trade triangle Liverpool would trade guns, cloth, iron, beer and brandy for slaves and delivery these to America. In return, America would send whale oil, lumber, fur, rice, silk, indigo and tobacco.</p>		<b>Harvest</b>	The process or period of gather in crops.
