<p>Tourism for health became very important in the Britain during the eighteenth century. Many spas offered supposedly health-giving mineral waters. Spas were places where visitors could bathe, drink the famous waters, gamble, eat, drink, dance, do business and arrange marriages.</p> <p>Following the Bank Holiday Act of 1871, workers had a statutory right to take holidays and the growth of the railway network led to the development and expansion of British seaside towns.</p> <p>During the 18th Century, it became a common belief that sea water, like the spa waters of towns such as Bath and Buxton, had medicinal properties.
