How does it work?

Children:

Learn 44 sounds and matching letters.

Learn to blend sounds to read words.

Read lots of specially written books.

This is **decoding**.



How does it work?

Children:

Talk a lot about what they have read to show they understand.

Listen to and discuss other ideas to deepen understanding.

This is **comprehending**.

How do phonics help us read?

Say "hello" to Fred.

Fred can only talk in sounds...

He says "c_a_t." Not cat.

We call this Fred Talk.

Watch Ruth Miskin explains Fred Talk.



How does my child learn to read at St Albert's?

All staff involved have been fully trained/refresh trained.

Split into 10 groups from Reception – Y2.

Children work daily on the phonics straight after Register, so MUST be punctual.

Work on new sounds, revisit other sounds, read red words, green words and then the story.



Children who read at home do well at school

- Read fluently
- Write confidently
- Speak articulately





How to help your child at home...

You can read stories with your child. Relentlessly.


Read favourite stories over and over again.


Read some stories at a higher level than they can read themselves.

Listen to them reading their home reading books.




Children are wired to thrive on repetition











Be a 'talk-a-lot' family


- Talk to your child as much as possible

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"Let's eat our lunch now."
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
[&]quot;Let's munch our lunch now."
