

Battle of the Atlantic 80

Next weekend, Liverpool hosts the celebrations for the 80th anniversary of the Battle of the Atlantic. From Friday onwards there will be many events taking place around the Pierhead. A BoA80 village will be open, including a riverside 1940s-themed military village, ships open to visitors, flypasts over the Mersey by historic aircraft including Navy Wings Swordfish, Poseidon, and the Battle of Britain Memorial flight, loads of FREE family activities with kit from the Royal Navy, Army, and RAF, charity stalls, food, cadet bands, 1940s music, dance, and other pop-up performances. HMS DEFENDER, a type 45 Destroyer and the French frigate The Bretagne will be at the Cruise Terminal and open for visitors Saturday and Sunday from 10.00am-4.00pm. The culmination of the BoA80 weekend, will be a Drumhead service at the Pier Head beginning at 12.00 noon. Music will be from His Majesty's Royal Marine Band Scotland. Please note that there is very limited seating for this short outdoor service.

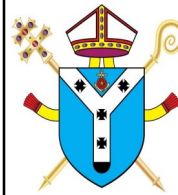


Sacrament of Reconciliation

A number of people have been asking when do we hold confessions in St. Albert's.

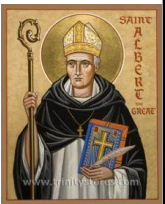

Once blessed, we will move to the Parish Centre for some light refreshments, and I will leave the Youth Club open for you to visit, and let me know what you think of the refurbished Youth Club.

World Communications Day

is celebrated today. The theme comes from Ephesians 4:15, Speaking with the heart - 'The truth in love'. In his message to mark the day, Pope Francis stresses the need to listen before speaking truth with a pure heart to "see beyond appearances and overcome the vague din which, in the field of information, does not help us discern in the complicated world in which we live."

The Holy Father, warning against indifference and indignation, hails the example of the great Doctor of the Church, St Francis de Sales, in particular his commitment to patient, heartfelt dialogue. A gifted theologian, his phrase 'Heart speaks to heart' inspired many, none more so than the recently canonised Saint John Henry Newman, who chose the phrase as his cardinalatial motto, 'Cor ad cor loquitur'. Catholics in England and Wales will remember with affection that 'Heart speaks unto heart' was also the theme for Pope Benedict XVI's historic visit to the UK in 2010.
